c) Transfer Guide Database being developed

- Currently ABE Grid published within ABE Articulation Guide. Guide provides much more information than just the grid.
- In a desire to make the grid more accessible, BCCAT is currently developing a database to host the BC transfer Guide. This will allow users to search on courses, course levels, institutions etc.
- This will also allow updates to be more quickly incorporated into the Transfer Guide. Using existing templates, working groups can send their changes to the Steering Committee who adopt and sign off on changes allowing for quicker turn around.
- This new database will have the capability to add all institutions currently on the grid as well as new schools.
- **Question**: In addition to having the database, does the Transfer Guide still need to be published as part of the Articulation Guide?
- d) Name of ABE needs to be addressed at the Steering Committee so there is provincial unity on this. Some colleges have started using Adult Upgrading instead of Adult Basic Education.
