**V. Introductions and Roundtable to briefly summarize new initiatives at institutions**

Institutions reported the following trends, issues, and concerns:

- More international students with mental health issues and (often undiagnosed) learning disabilities
- Enrollment in short-term, customized programs such as study tours is strong
- An increase in students from India and Vietnam; decrease in Chinese students at many (one institution reported the addition of the "gao kao" or Chinese university entrance exam as prerequisite had resulted in reduction of Chinese applicants)
- Some Indian students struggle with academic preparation and critical thinking though their English is sufficient (most get direct entry)
- Some institutions find a high rate of "no-show" students and attrition among Indian students
- Challenges in supporting students who gain direct entry with IELTS 6.0. Tension between access and gatekeeping regarding admissions.
- Development and delivery of support courses for ELL in regular undergraduate and graduate programs
- Greater stability in senior leadership for many institutions this year (relative to last few years)
- LINC providers report long waitlists
- LINC funding has been allocated for next three years: 6% decrease year-over-year
- Increasing focus on internationalization or interculturalization initiatives

- Academic pushback from some English departments: “leave the research paper to us, work on sentence-level accuracy”
- “Partnerships” as strategic goal at many institutions
- Creative ways to deal with chronic workload issues; e.g., combining skills so that instructors have fewer students if not fewer classroom hours
- Academic integrity and creative students strategies to circumvent it (e.g. fake IDs for placement- test takers)

## **VI. Report from System Liaison Person (SLP) and Deans and Directors: Tanis Sawkins**

As SLP rep, Tanis acts as our liaison at BCCAT and other committees such as DDDE. The next DDDE meeting is May 25, 2017. She also attends the Joint Annual Meeting (JAM) with other SLPs, ICPs (institutional contact persons) and Articulation Chairs and Co-Chairs. She reported the following:

- Greater institutional stability than in past years
- “Suburbanization” of immigrant experience – growth in Surrey and Fraser Valley
- Operational impacts of tuition increase and AUG
- Increased # of students from India
- More international students on immigration track
- Issues around language proficiency, how to support EAL learners and faculty who teach them
- More “late arrival” youth
- Increased concerns with mental health and cognitive challenges among students
- IRCC awarded LINC contracts for 2017-20 – a 6% decrease each year.
- LINC allocations are based on landing data – many immigrants land in Montreal but find their way to Vancouver – thus long waitlists in Vancouver
- IRCC may open up interim bidding process based on local needs
- New K-12 curriculum is competency/mastery system
- EAP IV is a measurement of English language proficiency –*not* equivalent to Eng 12

- International education remains a high priority for AVED: 3<sup>rd</sup> most significant industry in BC, with 68,000 in private PSE (career and degree-granting) & 45,000 in public PSE
- Top 5 source countries (2015): China, S.Korea, India, Japan, US
- Next 5: Brazil, Saudi Arabia, Mexico, Taiwan, Hong Kong
- Huge contributor to BC’s economy – see a report from Kunin (link below)

Meeting began at 9:00 am

### **I. Guest speaker: Christy Sebelius (Instructor) and Byron Crossley (Ed Tech Department): *Academic Integrity Teacher Resources for Multiple Modes of Delivery***

Academic Integrity resource or AIRport

- Built to address academic integrity (term is less punitive than plagiarism)
- Purpose: To address a need identified by instructors
- Academic integrity is culturally-based
- Name: instead of modules there are *destinations*, passport-based reward system
- What's included: student assessment, blog

Units:

- Unit 1: What is academic integrity, video (Murdoch university, Dubai), case studies
- Unit 2: Time management: assignment calculator, helpful handouts
- Unit 3: Research – using Wikipedia, using library database (how to narrow your topic)
- Skills: paraphrasing, in-text quotes, summarizing, on-line quizzes and practice
- Articles on plagiarism (Fareed Zakarais, Dan Brown copyright case – case studies)

The blog (Face-to-Face delivery):

- Benefits: group or pair focused (thus is communicative); hands-on (interactive); teacher inclusion via feedback
- Challenges: time constraints in the classroom, the environment (uses paper)

Moodle:

- Moodle site is a familiar interface for the students
- Badging system “gamifies” the site
- Multiple choice questions as well as providing examples with options of good academic practice, unethical academic practice, or plagiarism
- Students are told to use citation builders (e.g., 3<sup>rd</sup> party apps) but never rely on them completely as not all citation builders produce accurate and correct citations.
- Benefits:
  - Classroom can be flipped
  - Caters to students' sensibilities with technology
  - Minimal classroom time needed for delivery/exploration
  - Reward system
- Challenges:
  - Monitoring individual student progress
  - Classroom time needed for guidance and feedback

- Instructor's fear of technology
- Considerations:
  - copyright: Bill C-11
  - asked Murdoch for permission to use video
  - ease of teacher access and utilization
- Problems:
  - is video culturally insensitive?
  - response: give context before video – could be teachable moment

## II. BCCAT introductions: Ruth Erskine (9:45-10:05)

Spring update:

- Ruth is articulation committee coordinator
- Last year: refreshed website: 67 articulation committees in BC
  - Categorized committees so it is easier to navigate website
  - 6 categories of committees: arts and science, trades and vocational, etc.
    - ESL is categorized under “developmental”
- Resources are on main page
- Chairs and minutes – functionality to add graphics
- Trying to make site as user-friendly as possible

Call for TIF proposals: BCCAT is looking for more proposal submissions this year

- Form to complete which goes to transfer and articulation selection committee; this group then decides which proposals receive funding
- Proposals will be assessed in September

Other:

- Articulation companion resource available on BCCAT website
- Nominations open for this year's champions of articulation system
- Joint annual meeting: Westin Wall Centre in fall
  - Format will include panelists addressing questions related to articulation and transfer
- In BC we have the best transfer system in Canada – Alberta system was being modelled on ours
- Transfer Guide is running two systems concurrently
  - The newer TCS will have same interface and will post reciprocal agreements
  - Some Albertan institutions (e.g., Athabaska U.) are already on BCCAT system; no new ones will be added in the transfer guide – they will be posted as reciprocal agreements
- BCCAT recommends we make comments regarding new K-12 changes as a committee rather than as individuals
  - Literacy 12 exam result will be standalone on transcript (it will not be blended with a course mark)
- 8 committees (all ABE) use Moodle for posting docs, comments, evaluating courses, etc.

- BCCAT has opted to move to Moodle for all committees; KPU will be host of Moodle for BCCAT
- Question: If Registrar wants to know whether an ESL course can transfer, how would the registrar find that information? BC Registrar's Association is place to ask; Ruth will follow up to this question with BCRA.

#### **V. New Motions and Actions/Closing Items**

Discussion:

- Needs to be dialogue between incoming and outgoing reps to ensure the knowledge of the articulation process is not lost
- Pre-vetting system:
  - Perhaps a pre-vetting sub-committee could be formed to review submissions, or
  - Reps could review submissions with a mentor (such as outgoing institutional rep)
- Trinity Western (ESLi) is a private non-degree granting institution and is therefore not affiliated with BCCAT; thus, courses from ESLi cannot be articulated. The 2017-2018 Guide will reflect this correction.

Four actions and motions were proposed:

1. Motion to form one subcommittee to enhance the current course articulation checklists and more clearly define the process of preparing a course to submit for articulation (one checklist for EAP and one for Access).
  - Membership must include reps from both Access and EAP
  - Incorporate feedback from the Task Force discussion
  - Chairs of the working groups necessarily involved (LISA is willing to do this)
