

**Camosun College Institutional Report
April 29, 2019**

Camosun College currently runs a 2-year Hospitality Management diploma (HGMT) with two cohorts of students, as well as a 16-month post-degree diploma (PDD) in Tourism Management (TMGT). Both require work terms – 2 for the HGMT diploma and 1 for the PDD.

The HGMT and TMGT programs currently has 3.5 EFTE's with Carl Everitt continuing as chair and Stephen Scott continuing as program leader. David Pritchard is at 50% status and teaches the applied classes. David Armstrong currently works as the co-op internship coordinator in addition to a 75% teaching load. Lee Aitchison will retire at the end of August 2019.

Practical capacity for the program is 35 students for each cohort, making overall capacity in the hospitality and tourism programs 210 students. Of this, we are currently running with approximately 45 students in the first year of the HGMT diploma, 34 in the second year of the HGMT program, and 20 in the PDD. The last class to complete the PDD was approximately 20 students.

Application numbers

Domestic applications have been declining – the current year reflected a drop of approximately 10 students year over year. We are beginning the process of reviewing applications for the 2019 Fall intake and do not have an interim update.

Internationalization

We have aimed to keep the international component of the HGMT program at 40%, although the demand is there to go higher. We have consciously kept this as a target due to the language and structural demands of the program, particularly in the applied classes. The students are coming predominantly from China, although there are several students from Vietnam and India enrolled.

The PDD program is almost exclusively international, with few domestic applicants. Camosun International has done an effective job recruiting, with strong candidates from India, the Philippines, China, Vietnam, Russia, Turkey, Ukraine, and Japan.

Attrition

Attrition has held to the traditional average of about 10% or 3 students per cohort per year for the HGMT program. There was no attrition in the current intake of PDD students.

Growth

To foster growth, we have established course sequencing to allow for January intakes. This year 14 students enrolled. This intake continues to grow and make our programs accessible and flexible.

Second Cohort for the Aboriginal Culinary Arts Tourism and Hospitality Management Program (ACATHM)

The first cohort of the Aboriginal Culinary Arts Tourism and Hospitality Management Program recently graduated with 10 students. Songhees Nation in conjunction with Camosun Culinary Arts, and the Hospitality Management Program partnered in a two-year pilot project for building capacity in Indigenous communities. The program is delivered at the Songhees Wellness Centre. Professional Cooking Level One, Hospitality Restaurant Operations and Indigenous Tourism are taught by Camosun faculty, with an embedded workplace integrated learning component. The second cohort started in March of this year with 13 students registered. We continue to learn and grow in developing best practices for the delivery of this type of program. Kenya for Education and Employment Program

The Camosun Hospitality and Tourism Management program continues to take the lead in KEFEP 05 (Kenya for Education and Employment Program), a 3.5-year development initiative for educational reform in Kenya, as part of a federal partnership through Colleges and Institutes Canada. Through this partnership Camosun is working with Kenya Coast National Polytechnic (KCNP) in developing curriculum for their Hospitality, Tourism, and Electrical programs. Carl Everitt and Lee Aitchison have been working with KCNP on building capacity with faculty and the design and development of a Safari Lab, Pastry Lab, and Mixology Lab, in conjunction with designing a competency based national curriculum for these areas. Program Advisory Committee

Camosun continues to build and maintain strong partnerships with local industry. The Hospitality and Tourism Management program Advisory Committee at Camosun continues to strengthen with 12 key members that represent broad sectors of the industry. We meet twice a year to discuss new curriculum ideas and responses to challenges and opportunities that the industry faces.

Issues

As the programs and initiatives continue to expand, there are physical capacity concerns with the applied classes. The program is housed in Dunlop House, with very specific scheduling requirements due to the scheduling and time requirements of the applied classes.

Succession planning has come to the forefront recently with the upcoming retirement of Lee Aitchison. We are starting to building capacity with our term faculty by supporting and encouraging participation in PIDP programs and Graduate degrees.

Changes to entrance requirements

We have recently removed the entrance requirements for the one-thousand-hour work experience prerequisite, as we feel that the students will gain a significant amount of experience during their co-ops. The reality is that most of students are working in the industry whilst attending the program due to economic needs.

We have had difficulty consistently verifying the accuracy of work history claims of international students. When considering philosophically what the majority of the students hoped to gain from the program, we didn't feel the 1000-hour work experience was necessarily a predicator of success.

1. Departmental Changes/Updates

- Grant Unger and I continue to instruct a majority of the courses in our program. We also have a term (60%) instructor Becky Pelkonen. Our service courses are taught by a variety of faculty from the Business program.
- 32 First year students enrolled in Tourism Management
- Still a large number of International students with low domestic numbers

2. Program/Course Update

- We separated our current Tourism and Recreation Management Program (TRMP) into 2 distinct Diploma programs for the fall of 2018:
 - 1) Tourism Management Diploma
 - 2) Recreation Management Program

The 2 streams have been very successful and allows students to focus more specifically on the discipline that they choose.

The Tourism Management Diploma follows the Provincial Core curriculum and includes a work placement for students. We will be offering a new course in the 2nd year of the program this fall for the Tourism Management Program: Risk Management & Liability in Tourism and Recreation (TOUR 240). The diploma will be available in face to face or online format.

3. Other Items of Interest

- Cranbrook Tourism has been established for 1 year now. We continue to work with stakeholders to establish relationships for student projects and work placements.
- College of the Rockies will be building a new residence with 96 beds for students to accommodate the low vacancy rate in Cranbrook.

Please find below my Institute report for Articulation/TEC

Program Changes-Additions – We are presently undergoing a full review of the BTM, to be finalised this year. Course drift, core and simplification of course offerings are some of the main issues under evaluation. Review of all the diplomas to be undertaken next.

Important Course Updates – Because of faculty retirement, illness and sabbaticals, as well as the increase in student numbers a much higher percentage of courses (over 25%) are being taught by sessional instructors in the hospitality diploma.

Agreements signed – Rob Hood has been given course release to work on this.

New Initiatives – We are currently waiting the outcome of our most recent Dean search. Three potential candidates were interviewed in December, with one being selected as the finalist. We are hoping to hear by the end of May if/when the new Dean may be starting at TRU.

We are still working on getting our masters approved.

There is some discussion around campus that our faculty will be getting a new building in conjunction with business. Very exciting if it ever happens.

Attrition – Our normal attrition rate is an average of 25 - 30% between first and second year.

All indications for this year looks like a much lower rate, probably at about 10%.

Application numbers up or down - We have had a 100% increase in student numbers for the Resort & Hotel Management Diploma.

We capped the number of first year students at 40, for the first time in my 10 years at TRU.

International up or down – Our first year intake is mainly international students, with 80% being from India, 15% from China and the rest domestic.
